Objective

The rapid progress of artificial intelligence (AI) and machine-learning raises complex challenges regarding benefits and risks for the criminal justice system. AI could bring benefits if it is used to predict crime and as a criminal intelligence tool. However, software programmes can malfunction and cause serious harm without being considered – as things stand today – "entities" subject to criminal liability.

After explaining the technical aspects of Al and its implications for privacy-preserving big data technologies, this conference will focus on how Al could be used in criminal proceedings, enabling the shift from a traditionally reactionary approach to crimefighting to one that is more proactive and preventative in character. It will discuss possible solutions for remedying the risks posed by Al and robotics in the criminal justice domain.

This event is aimed at judges, lawyers, prosecutors and police investigators with a view to highlighting the aspects of Al already in use today as well as the changes and opportunities on the horizon.
